Consultation on support materials and advance information for exams 2021

To make exams in 2021 less daunting for GCSE, AS and A level students, for many subjects they will be told in advance some of the topics that will or will not be on the papers, helping them to manage their revision. For some subjects, students will be given support material in the exams, such as formulae and equations.

The government has published a consultation on the approach to be taken and parents can contribute their views. 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
School responsibility for Track and Tracing over the Christmas break

Public health have agreed a 6-day window after the final day of teaching in which schools are asked to remain contactable so they can assist with contact tracing where necessary. For Nailsea School, 6 days after the final day of teaching takes us to the 24th December, after which the government's Track and Trace system will take over.

This arrangement should allow enough time for positive COVID-19 cases to be identified and confirmed by a test, and relevant contacts in the school setting to be traced and informed.

Public Health England have issued the following advice:

- For the first 6 days after teaching ends, up until Christmas Eve, if a student or staff
 member tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19), having developed symptoms
 within 48 hours of being in school, the school is asked to assist in identifying close
 contacts and advising self-isolation, as the individual may have been infectious whilst
 in school
- Where a student or staff member tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19), having developed symptoms more than 48 hours since being in school, the school should <u>not</u> be contacted. Parents and carers should follow contact tracing instructions provided by NHS Track and Trace.



- Your name
- Your child's name
- Their year/tutor group
- Date of first symptoms, and brief description of symptoms
- The date of the test
- The date of the positive result

The account will be monitored up until 24 December, so that we can continue to undertake the contact tracing and communicate with families of those children needing to self-isolate.

Safety over the Holiday period

I am sure all of #TeamNailsea wants to ensure we can return next term without people having to isolate. This does mean we have a responsibility over our actions during the two week break.

Whilst we continue to follow the risk assessment within school, I would encourage you to reduce the risk of your household having to self-isolate by adhering to the Hands, Face, Space controls when out in the community, and being extra vigilant in spotting the symptoms of COVID, and the whole household following self-isolation rules until receiving a negative test result.

As a reminder, the three symptoms are:

- high temperature
- a new continuous cough
- loss of smell/taste

If anyone in the household has one or more of these symptoms they, and, and their whole household must stay home (do not attend school or work), and get a test. Everyone in the home must stay home until the test result is received.

If the test result is positive then:

- report positive test results to the school immediately (see above table for dates over the Christmas period);
- the affected individual must stay home for the length of time instructed by Trace and Trace (usually 10 days),
- all other members of the household must self-isolate (for a period of 10 days, if no symptoms occur during this time)

Christmas Window, 23rd – 27th December

From 23 December to 27 December, you may choose to form a Christmas bubble. Social distancing still plays an important part in keeping everyone safe and in not spreading the virus.

A Christmas bubble will be able to spend time together in private homes, including second homes and caravans, to attend places of worship, or meet in a public outdoor place. If you do form a Christmas bubble, you should not meet socially with friends and family you do not live with in your home or garden unless they are part of your Christmas bubble. In all other settings, people should follow local restrictions in the tier in which they are meeting.

A Christmas bubble consists of three households, your household makes up one of the three households. The Christmas window allows families and friends to get together, but people should remain aware of social distancing guidelines and allowing good ventilation when meeting indoors. If you do not form a Christmas bubble, you should continue to follow the guidance for the tier you are in.

New Years Eve

The Christmas Window will have closed by New Year's Eve and we will be back to the Tier restrictions, this means no socialising indoors, and meeting only with groups of 6 or fewer outside.
