
A Word from the Wessex Learning Trust

New Year, New Start, New Partnership

Nailsea School has entered the New Year with a new exciting partnership, after joining the Wessex Learning Trust. The school has been in discussion with the Multi Academy Trust (MAT) for several years, to review the expectations of the venture, and due diligence and make a measured decision. Nailsea School has over 1000 students on roll and employs over 140 staff members who have been TUPE'd across to the new organisation.

Nailsea School is the 14th school to join the Wessex Learning Trust, and the 2nd secondary school to be added to its portfolio. The

benefit of joining a MAT means that teaching and learning expertise can be shared across sites and that financially the school will benefit from economies of scale. A number of collaborations have already begun with teachers sharing best practice across departments including in Science and English.

Jo Hopkinson, Chair of the Governors, Nailsea School said:-

"After three years of discussion and interviews with a number of trusts, we feel very positive about the Wessex Learning Trust and strongly believe that this is the trust most aligned to the ethos of Nailsea School. Partnerships are already being made between governors, senior staff and middle leaders and we are confident that this is a very positive move for the whole of the Nailsea School community."



Gavin Ball, Chief Executive of the Wessex Learning Trust said:-

"We welcome Nailsea School to our Multi Academy Trust family, we encourage our schools to be at the centre of their community and raise aspirations and achievement. 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Finding Inspiration in Testing Times! By Mrs Corkerton

Right now, it's easy to feel a sense of isolation. The library at school is closed and it's hard looking at the rows of empty books when normally they'd be travelling out and creating joy. For many of us, this period of confinement is alleviated by the different ways we can talk to each other, but nothing can replace the thing we tend to take granted: the immediacy of physical contact with people around us.

However, there is one thing that is worth a second look: some of our most famous cultural figures also faced challenges of self-isolation. They struggled with change, the 'new normal' but somehow – and this is the amazing bit – produced famous works of art during their 'lockdown'.

When the bubonic plague rolled unchecked across Europe it led to the closure of theatres – back then the dominant cultural form. This was bad news for William Shakespeare who was unable to see his work performed; 'large gatherings' were a nono. He left the city but took advantage of the time to work on some of his greatest plays, including Macbeth and King Lear. Similarly, Thomas Nashe, another famous Elizabethan playwright, left London during the plague and wrote a play on his experiences of living through a pandemic.

Scroll forward a few decades later and it was Isaac Newton's turn. A recurrence of the plague put the kibosh on his university studies at Cambridge, so he went home to his family to self-isolate and in the absence of tik-tok opted to develop his

theories on calculus and optics. It was here that he questioned why an apple falls and in answering the question, realised that gravity ties the universe together.

Edvard Munch – an artist famed for his paint "The Scream" - had Spanish flu in 1919, the most recent 'global' pandemic. He reflected on his illness and created the aptly-titled 'Self-Portrait with Spanish Flu', a lyrical depiction of the painter

looking a bit under the weather. It's seen as a key document of the time.

Laptop Lending Library—Fundraiser

In response to the third lockdown, we launched a 'Go Fund Me' charitable campaign to help with our IT provision in the form of a 'Laptop Lending Library'. Whilst many families are managing, often the home learning is challenging, with students working from phones, tablets, or struggling with IT that works intermittently. We are regularly hearing of issues with siblings or parents sharing the same device and having to adopt irregular working patterns (working throughout the day and late into the evening) to get the work done. This is having a direct affect on students ability to learn.

The school received 50 laptops from the government, had a further 13 donated by our PTA, and received Covid19 funding for a further 10. Most of these 73 laptops have been loaned to families struggling to work online, with only a few left in school on reserve

When the appeal was launched we were receiving an average of 3 requests a day for students to borrow laptops, which is why we launched a fundraising campaign to increase the number of laptops we had available for loan. We are aiming to purchase a further 10 laptops (either new or reconditioned) to extend the capacity of our Laptop Lending Library and work towards an online education that includes all of our learners. We have exceeded our target of £3,000 and were blown away by the incredible generosity of our community it was amazing—THANK YOU!

The appeal is still open as any further donations that we receive will be invested in additional IT equipment to benefit our learners for example more laptops, webcams, dongle Wi-Fi access. If you are able to donate any amount it could really help someone's digital learning experience and make a big difference to their future. Click here for further information.

Year 9 student, Seth B undertook research into this WWI Family History. Mrs Dowland was impressed by the incredible research both into his Great-great grandfather's role and the historical context.

My WW1 Family History by Seth B

James Hutchinson (9 July 1895 – 22 January 1972) was my Great-Great Granddad and a solider during WW1. He was a recipient of the Victoria Cross, the highest and most prestigious award for gallantry in the face of the enemy that can be awarded to British and Commonwealth forces, of which only 1538 have been awarded.

Before enlisting in the army, he was a teacher and was born in Greater Manchester. On the 28th September 1914, he was enlisted in the army as a Private at the age of 20, and trained until 3rd of May 1915, when he officially joined the British Army.



Hutchinson was a private in the 2/5th battalion Lancashire Fusiliers, which was an infantry of foot -soldiers and was a regiment of soldiers from the county. With in that, he was a member and fought with the (55th (West Lancashire) Division), who were known for extensive combat during WW1. Originally, they were dispersed around England to defend vulnerable areas for attack, such as railway lines, bridges, and tunnels, with the men mainly going to Canterbury and Oxfordshire. The men were also used as reinforcements on the western Front.

Ficheux

In November 1915, the whole regiment were demanded to reform, and were shipped to Northern France to fight on the western front. Their job this time was to carry out trench raids, making small- scale night-time raids on enemies, in this case German Soldiers. They fought in Pas De Calais and held a sector of the front line from February 1916 to July.

A large raid on the 28th of June, earned him the Victoria Cross. During the day in the commune of Ficheux, he crossed 'No Mans Land' and came under heavy German Fire. He was the leading man and entered the trench, shot two sentries, and cleared two of the traverses. After they captured the trench, he removed the dying soldiers to safety. In this raid he lost his brother, and his other 2 were killed later in the war. The regiment lost 1100 soldiers In Pas De Calais.

Guillemont

The division then moved south to participate in the Battle of the Somme. Their objective this time, was to capture the village of Guillemont, and nearby German trenches. Before this, they came under attack twice by German soldiers, which saw his brother Arthur get killed. The 3 attacks on the village were all unsuccessful and saw 4.126 casualties from the division. This was the prelude- start and trigger- to the Battle of Guillemont, a smaller battle that happened during the Somme.


Battle of the Somme

The Battle of the Somme began on the 1st July 1916 and ended on the 18th of November. It was fought between the British and French army's, against the German empire. The aim was for the Alliance to push Germany out of France. Initially, they used a technique called 'Bombardment' which consisted of a week of firing shells However, the Germans hid in underground bunkers while this happened. Then when the Allies were crossing no mans land, they would sneak out and fire machine guns at them, with no where to hide. All together 1,000,000 soldiers from

all the armies died. Whilst it failed, it drained the German army by killing lots of their soldiers and using their equipment.

James only fought at the Somme for 3 weeks as he lost the sight in his right eye to a shell splinter. He returned to England to receive treatment and was awarded his Victoria Cross by King George V at Buckingham Palace on 2nd December 1916. He then became a Bombing Instructor to new soldiers, and worked in the Labour Corps. Finally, he was discharged from the British Army, as a Corporal on the 17th December 1918. He was known as Jim Smiler, for also being happy and positive on the battlefield.





For most conspicuous bravery. During an attack on the enemy's position this soldier was the leading man, and, entering their trench, shot two sentries and cleared two of the traverses.

After our object had been gained and retirement ordered, Private Hutchinson, on his own initiative, undertook the dangerous task of covering the retirement, and he did this with such gallantry and determination that the wounded were removed into safety. During all this time this gallant soldier was exposed to fieroe fire from machine-guns and rifles at close quarters.

Food Technology

With the Food Tech classroom at school getting little use this year, the team decided students could make use of their kitchens at home and impress their family with a range of healthy, nutritious meals (and baked treats too of course!).

Miss Hurst and Mrs Goodwin set up cooking demonstration videos, whilst Mrs Hounsell braved a live cook-along! Students across year groups have been sending in photographs of their cooking. A popular 'home-cookery' group has been set up for yr9 students with a video posted once a week showing step-by-step instructions for a main meal dish. The recipe includes optional variations to adapt the recipe for numbers of people they are serving, vegetarian diet, or to suite their taste by swapping ingredients with alternatives. The aim to promote independence in the kitchen, and to inspire an enjoyment in a crucial life skill (also, a welcome break for hard-working parents and carers to have their dinner prepared).

GCSE groups have been honing their skills with advanced recipes including blind baking pastry and making butter using double cream to use within their recipe. This practical work links with the food science theory they are learning as part of the course, and what better way to learn by 'doing' rather than a PowerPoint. As Heston Blumenthal would say a creation of 'multi-sensory molecular gastronomy', or as we know it 'cooking'.

The team have been blown away by the response to home-cooking. Students are not only following recipes provided, but independently sourcing and baking their own choice of food such as jam tarts, pasties and baked Alaska.

Although we love seeing the visual evidence, we hope those that are eating the outcomes are equally impressed!









Year 9 have blown us away with their extended writing on the tropical rainforest and have started their new topic on globalisation.





The aim of this bulletin is to share with you useful information, strategies and resources in order to support our students mental wellbeing.

THE IMPORTANCE OF ROUTINE

It is safe to say that the coronavirus has turned life as we know it upside down, and the introduction of a third lockdown to kick of the new year has left us all a bit deflated.

We have found ourselves making adjustments to our lives in order to continue to function as close to normal as possible. However, being on our second stint of home schooling many of you maybe asking well what is the point of following the school day, I'm at home why should I bother, I'd rather have a lie in.

But keeping a daily routine can help us feel more in control of things and in a world were we currently have very little control over our lives taking control of our day-to-day routine can really aid our mental health. It can help us to cope with change, to form healthy habits and reduce our stress levels.

ROUTINE CAN ANCHOR US

Routine can be an anchor. No matter what's going on in our day, knowing that we will have an online check in at 8.30am or having our evening meal around 6 pm, can be a real comfort. Coping with unpredictable periods of time can feel more doable when we have a little structure in place to look to.

REDUCE STRESS

Having a daily routine can help to reduce our stress levels. Trying to remember things can be really stressful and we can fill our brains up with everything on our 'to do' list; which can be incredibly overwhelming. When we have a routine, a lot of the things we do day-to-day slot in, and we don't have to think about them anymore. For example, we don't have to remember to clean our teeth, because we know from habit that teeth-cleaning comes after breakfast every day. Routine can take the guesswork and uncertainty out of bits of our day, which can allow us to feel more in control and less stressed.

POSITIVE HABITS

Having a routine can help us to create positive daily habits and to



IMPROVE SLEEP

One of the things that having a regular routine can really help with, is sleep. Sleep is really important for our mental health because going to bed and waking up at a similar time most days allows our body gets used to our sleep-wake cycle and sets our sleep-wake clock accordingly. This means that by having a regular sleep routine, especially if we build in some time to wind down before we go to bed each day, we should begin to find that we find it easier to get to sleep and sleep better once we are asleep.

it can make it easier to keep up with them because we have the

time to do them and they become our 'new normal'.

BUILD IN ME TIME

Creating a routine allows us to build in time for the important things. This includes time to rest, relax, and have fun. It is not perfect – there are always going to be days when something overruns, a job takes three times as long as we expect it to take. But structuring our time to include some downtime increases the likelihood that we will manage to have that time most days. And will impact positively on our mental health in the long run.

Routine can be helpful when it comes to managing our mental health. The predictability of routine can offer some comfort in an otherwise unpredictable world. But we have to be a little bit careful not to get so stuck in our routines that they start to cause us stress or stop us from being able to do things that we want to do. As long as we're finding our routines helpful and not harmful and feel able to flex and change them as our life changes, they can be a great thing to build on and develop over time.
