Dear Parents/carers

Although we had planned carefully for the full reopening, it was not possible to predict how successful it would be. I think it has become apparent that our students certainly appreciate the value of school; not just to provide an education but also to provide positive social interactions. It is continuing to be a joy to have the students back in the building. I would also like to thank the staff who have bounced back into school with agility and energy. They have taught, listened, checked in on wellbeing and even been present during clinical testing!

This week's key information is listed below:

Notifying the school about suspected/confirmed cases of COVID-19

All families should continue to use the c19@nailseaschool.com email address to notify the school of any suspected and confirmed cases of COVID-19 within their households. This email is monitored at all times and using this as the means of notification will enable the school to take any follow up action as required as promptly as possible.

Asymptomatic testing of staff and pupils in schools and colleges over the Easter holiday

It is important for staff and students to keep testing through the Easter holidays to manage the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19), as part of a regular habit of testing at home every 3-4 days (twice a week). NHS Test and Trace will be supplying sufficient test kits to schools and colleges to enable this to happen. Please note this is late change from the Government this week and students were given a different instruction during the testing sessions that took place before the u-turn. I will be sharing more details of the plans over the Easter break in my letter next week.
