#SWABSQUAD

Since early January a group of staff who Mrs Elliott affectionately refers to as

"The Swab Squad" have been involved with the LFT (Lateral Flow Testing) of staff and students and this past week they have completed the mass testing programme. Lateral Flow Testing is designed to measure a Covid19 viral load and to help identify people who are asymptomatic, it is not as accurate as a PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction) test.

Over this period, the Swab Squad have carried out over 3,000 student tests and over 1,000 employee tests which is no mean feat for people who have also been trying to do their "normal" role. The testing program, which has been carried out across secondary schools across England, it has been an intense amount of work, above and beyond the usual role of a school.


With the student testing each year group had to go through a number of stages. Stage one was organising appointments for initial testing and parental consent, stage two involved registering the students, followed by the uploading of contact details and individual barcodes to the NHS website. Stage three included managing student arrival times, collecting them safely from their year group bubbles, whilst ensuring social distancing. The next step included explaining the testing procedure and allowing students to swab themselves ready for their test sample to be processed by one of the team. The processing of the tests included precise timing, whilst waiting for the chemical reaction to develop and uploading the results to the NHS website.

Testing took place in groups of 6 with each testing area being sanitised and thoroughly cleaned between each individual test. A number of school staff had to be trained in the correct procedure to ensure compliance was met. Each stage had to be completed three times for each student in each year group in readiness of the distribution of the home-testing kits.



Prior to student testing and during lockdown staff working on site had been testing regularly too, in our makeshift testing booths set up in the well ventilated space of the atrium. All-in-all the school have completed, processed and uploaded in excess of 4,000 LFT tests and distributed over 3,000 boxes of Home Testing Kits. Great work – Swab Squad!

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The BIG IDEAS Programme.

The Big Ideas Programme is an annual enrichment programme that focuses on sustainability, and combines STEM learning and STEM activities with enterprise and employability skills.

The programme usually starts with a Big Ideas Day where teams of students learn about sustainability and how science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) skills and careers can help solve sustainability issues. This has had to be implemented this year in a very different and innovative way given the recent lockdown.

At Nailsea School, we have worked with all Year 7 students using live lessons on Teams using one of the functions called Breakout Rooms. This has allowed the students to collaborate in groups to identify, research and develop a solution to a sustainability issue of their choice. These issues have included ocean pollution, landfill, food waste, water waste, vehicle pollution and global warming.

It has been so heartening and encouraging to see our students really embrace the issues that affect our planet and to already come up with very creative and innovate ideas and solutions.

The next step is that the teams will be entered for the Big Ideas Competition and develop their solutions to compete with other teams from schools across the UK. If the teams get through the regional finals, which may be held at universities local to their school, they then present their idea at the national final that in the past has taken place at the Palace of Westminster and is hosted by a cross-party group of MPs.





Y10 engineers have been tasked with design and modelling a can crusher. Students were tasked to model each component to scale and then assemble them using a 3D design software called Fusion 360.

Students learnt how to design, edit, render, assemble and create technical drawings during this project. All students designed the same design and then developed it afterwards to an improved and more efficient version.

Now students have returned to school we hope that they will be able to create a manufacture plan and make their ideas in reality.







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Lockdown Bakes - Mrs Hounsell



For my degree, I studied Spanish, Portuguese and Music which presented me the opportunity of living in the biggest metropolitan city in South America, São Paulo, Brazil! It was there that I taught English to adults in a school situated in the heart of the favelas. I then moved to Granada in the south of Spain where I studied at the translation and interpretation department.



Although it has been an odd 6 weeks without the students, I can already sense that Nailsea is a very warm and welcoming school.

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Book Launch—End to End by Mr Jones

Our Head of English at Nailsea School and resident cycling obsessive, Mr Jones, has a book published this April telling the story of the journey from Land's End to John o'Groats. A lyrical and personal account of his journey sits alongside meetings with amazing people; cyclists like the incredible Eileen Sheridan who covered the distance in under three days in 1954, or current



men's record holder Michael Broadwith who did it in a scarcely believable 43 hours. Mr Jones reaches further back to the very first attempts in the 1880s, undertaken on penny farthings, fuelled by Victorian values and patent medicine.

For Mr Jones, what started as a simple way to frame the narrative and help write the book, soon changed into a deeper search for meaning and self-discovery, played out on the road from Bodmin Moor to, the Cairngorms and the Caithness coast. As he puts it; "End to End is a tale of hope and ambition, of what happens when things go wrong and how hard it is to make them right. It is about courage, obsession and joy, but above all else, it is an exploration of why journeys matter for all of us."

French literary giant <u>Paul Fournel</u> says it a bit better than Mr Jones: "*it is a brilliant book, a triple trip : one on the road, one in History and one into the author's mind. Cycling is about all that*".

"End to End" is published by the Little, Brown Book Group and is available in hardback everywhere from Thursday 1 April.
