### PH Blaise and PH Trinity Ride into Town

This term we were fortunate to be visited by members of the Avon & Somerset Mounted police section. Sergeant Ed Amor, PC Rowan Webber, rode in on PH Blaise and PH Trinity to visit our Year 10 Asdan students and some of our Hub students too.

The police officers talked at length about the different sections of the constabulary, including dog handlers, firearms officers, traffic police, PCSO, CID, Specials and Communications team. PC Webber who was a former pupil of Nailsea School also talked about the team that it took to get the horses out, those that looked after them as well as the background admin teams.

The horses were impeccably behaved (as were the students!) and even demonstrated how they worked together – both moving at the same time and cantering on the green. It was incredibly impressive the level of training and coordination that the police achieved. One student commented that they looked like they were dancing. The officer and sergeant talked about their uniforms, showing their radios, and camera equipment as well as their batons and pepper spray. They also talked about the horses dress, including their knee pads, lights, bridle and high visibility rugs.

### Breaking News on the Solutions for the Planet – The Big Idea

The Big Ideas Programme is an annual enrichment programme that focuses on sustainability, and combines STEM learning and STEM activities with enterprise and employability skills.

During the lockdown, we have worked with all Year 7 students using live lessons on Teams using one of the functions called Breakout Rooms. This has allowed the students to collaborate in groups to identify, research and develop a solution to a sustainability issue of their choice. These issues have included ocean pollution, landfill, food waste, water waste, vehicle pollution and global warming.



Upon the students return in Term 4, we selected eight teams from across the Year 7 groups to further develop their Big Ideas, develop potential solutions to help improve their chosen sustainability issue, create a presentation, develop a business plan to support their solution and finally create a video to introduce themselves and to talk about their interests and the community they live in.

Just a few weeks ago the teams then submitted their work for entry in the Southern England regional finals.

As a school we are so pleased and proud to announce that three of these teams have been selected to represent the school in these regional finals. The teams are: Eco Art Project, Save Our Oceans and Treemendous!

The teams will be placed in one of two Southern England groups competing against teams from other schools. We will then receive detailed judges' to enable the teams to work on developing their Big Ideas ahead of their Regional Final – the resubmission date is 12:00 (midday) on Friday 28th May. We wish our teams well. All of our year 7 teams should be congratulated for their enthusiastic participation in the programme and I would also like to thank the Design and Technology teaching team (Miss Alright, Miss Hurst, Mrs Hounsell and Mr Stokes) as well as the Solutions for the Planet team for their encouragement, enthusiasm and support throughout this programme.

## **Bristol University COP Climate Change Conference**

On the 30th of March, four year 12 students participated in the University of Bristol climate change conference day based on the upcoming UN COP26, an international gathering of UN members to discuss climate change and implement strategies to combat it. It was in one of these conferences the Paris Accord was signed upon, this year it will take place in Glasgow.

The day entailed a series of debate-based challenges on key issues that are thought will come up in the COP26 debates. We spent the day role-playing the Alliance of Small Island States (AOSIS), an intergovernmental organisation of low-lying coastal and small island countries. We constructed and carried out debates against other schools plying worldwide countries and private companies such as Royal Dutch Shell and at the end of the day, we all voted on issues to form our own climate agreement from the point of views of our assigned players.

We all found the day greatly insightful and filled with unexpected challenges, especially when we were debating with small developing countries and large oil companies as they each have their own massively differing views and opinions to what we see in our own lives. We look forward to following the conferences on the 1-12 November and we would encourage you to do so too.



Every Tuesday this term, our A-Level Religious Studies students have taken part in an online webinar series organised by the Theology and Religious Studies department at the University of Chester. This has included talks by university lecturers on aspects of the A-Level RS specification. ### Year 9 Science - Garden Project

Y9 students had the opportunity to showcase their recent cross curricular skills in Science. Their current topic of 'infection and response' covered the requirements of both humans and plants to remain healthy.

The students were asked to design a garden, and work out the cost of produce, including flowers and vegetables as well as define the soil mineral concentrations that would be best suited for their plant growth.

Students used their maths skills to design the size and shape of their garden as well as all costs to cultivate and grow their plants before returning to their science knowledge to discuss why they had picked certain features for their garden and the impact each would have.













### **Improving Gender Balance (IGB)**

The project to make improvements in gender balance across STEM subjects was run by the Institute of Physics, through funding from the DfE. The aim of the project was ultimately to increase the uptake of Physics and STEM subjects by girls at A-Level and beyond, but the project also took a broader view at gender imbalance across all subjects for example it noted lack of boys taking English at A-Level.

The school received a number of direct interventions as part of the project. The project was introduced to governors via a Zoom meeting, teaching staff received 'Unconscious Bias' training, and were invited to take part in the IGB Festival (a series of CPD events held over a weekend). Our IGB Coach Steph Bevan spent some time with us looking into our curriculum planning and how to incorporate careers into our schemes of work. We also organised an IOP mentor for our sole female Y12 Physicist, with a focus on building confidence and supporting her in identifying careers links.

Despite COVID restrictions and lockdowns the project was moving forward successfully but unfortunately, it came to an end in March, when the DfE withdrew funding nationally, which was a shame as it was good opportunity to explore future pathways across genders.

The project has now been 'handed over' to staff and curriculum leaders within the school to continue. Nailsea School's learning from the project and key focus now is to focus on implementing the 'careers in context' into our schemes of work.



Year 7 students used their 3D modelling skills to create block characters using paper.

The students were able to use additional materials including split pins, pipe cleaners and colourful wool to add limbs and features. This resulted in moving necks and additional extras such as pigs snouts and monster tridents.

Inspired by a range of well-known heroes or made up using their own imagination and creativity the outcomes were great fun.













During Design and Technology lessons year 8 and 9 students have been learning different graphic drawing techniques such as Isometric, using a grid, 1-point perspective and 2 point perspective.

Using these skills can be challenging as there are lots of rules to remember! Students had to ensure they used construction lines (very light pencil lines) to mark out their drawings first before they commit to the lines.

We were very impressed with the 2point perspective drawings of a street corner, here are a few examples of the successful outcomes.

Welcome to Nailsea School's **Wellbeing Bulletin**The aim of this bulletin is to share with you useful information, strategies and resources in order to support our students mental wellbeing.



During the coronavirus we have relied on technology to help us keep in touch and maintain friendships. We have come up with new ways to be social when apart through YouTube quizzes, movies with friends via Zoom and for some young people joining online communities. One online community that has risen in popularity is Discord, which we recently wrote to our families about as 'one to watch' – click here for further information.

All social media platforms based around communication carry a certain level of risk, and we recommend signing up to one of the online newsletters of websites that offer free advice to families on app and internet safety, such as <a href="https://www.internetmatters.org">www.internetmatters.org</a> or <a href="https://www.internetmatters.org">nationalonlinesafety.com</a> . Each of these websites will offer a guide on individual apps and social media platforms, which will be able to give you a good understanding of the pitfalls of each one.

Here are some pointers from the **Internet Matters** organisation on how to keep your child safe online:

#### Keep Talking:

Stay interested in what they're doing online and discuss what they might have come across. Don't be afraid to tackle difficult subjects like cyberbullying, and sexting and pornography. Help them to be critical of things they see online and judge the quality and reliability of online sources. Acknowledge that this is difficult considering how content can be manipulated online to persuade even the savviest people. Talk together about how to manage some of these challenges and why it is important.

### **Manage Their Online Reputation:**

Let them know that anything they upload; email or message could stay online forever. Remind them that they should only post things online that they wouldn't mind you, their teacher or a future employer seeing. There are lots of stories in the media that highlight the importance of online reputation and clearly demonstrate how things that happened years ago can resurface in the future.





#### **Apply Controls**

Adjust the parental controls on your broadband and internet enabled devices, depending on your child's age. Your broadband provider can tell you how. Find out how to set up safe search in Google by going to the Google Safety Centre.

#### Privacy Matters:

Make sure they set high privacy settings on social networks. Encourage them to regularly change their passwords and never to share or put online any of their personal details like phone number, address or their school. If you are concerned about your child's online activity, then please do get in touch with the school safeguarding team who are always here to support you.
