The children (each pair being one Reception child and one Year 4) each chose a book to read together in the sunshine to help them spend some time together and get to know each other.

Further to this each Year 4 child wrote their buddy a letter to introduce themselves, while the reception children drew pictures which described them.

As we go forward with the year, the school is very excited to have a number of activities planned for the buddy pairs so that they can continue to get to know each other and support each other through their time at the school, with one of these being a nature walk planned for later in the term. These inter-year connections are invaluable for our learners and, without the constraints of bubbles, we are really excited about what the children will get up to this year.

Learning Instructions

Children in the Goldfinch class at Cheddar First School have this term been looking at instructions and learning how to order events.
