## **Coming Together to Remember**



On November 11<sup>th,</sup> learners and staff across our schools stopped to remember those who have given their lives in conflict. Schools organised a number of events to give children time to reflect, as well as learn about remembrance and the sacrifices our forebears made.

At Hugh Sexey, learners discussed the meaning of remembrance and took part in the work provided by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. This saw each tutor group learning about how other nations remember and examining other days and symbols used.

Axbridge children spent time recognising the importance of respecting and honouring the sacrifice others have made for their

future through activities in class, and in a whole school remembrance service. As part of this, Year 4 learner Oscar gave an exceptional and moving rendition of the Last Post on his Trumpet before the school took part in a traditional silence.

Elsewhere, our schools could all be seen with beautiful displays of poppies - for instance made from plastic bottles at East Brent and Fairlands. Also at Fairlands, the children went on a Remembrance parade around the school, with some learners wearing their Cadet, Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownie uniforms. The parade ended with a guard of honour and two minutes silence marked with the Last Post.

At Kings of Wessex, representatives from all of the Trust schools were invited to join them for a memorial service. Reverends Burns and Motion led staff and learners in prayer and reflection before Year 13 learner, Joe, sounded the Last Post on the Trumpet and a two-minute silence was held. Following this, wreaths were laid by representatives of each school in the Trust, as well as the four house groups at Kings.
