Risk Assessment and Contingency Planning

Please note yesterday (13th January) the Health Secretary, Sajid Javid, announced the government had decided to further reduce the legally required self-isolation period, down from seven days, following scientific advice. People must test negative for coronavirus on the fifth and sixth days (with the day a positive test is recorded being day one) of their isolation period before they are allowed to leave. The attached Risk assessment will be changed in line with this new advice when it comes into force on Monday 17th January.

As previously mentioned schools have been asked to plan contingencies, which includes a number of scenarios. This may require reduced operations as a direct result of pressures upon staffing availability or in the event of a worsening public health situation. In particular:

- 1. Onsite provision where staffing levels are too low: In the event of insufficient staffing to safely operate face to face learning will be prioritised for those students in key examination groups who are due to sit public examinations, as well as children of 'key workers' and those identified as vulnerable.

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Face Coverings

Thank you to students, staff and parents for following the new national guidance so carefully. This will remain in place until the next Government review. We will continue to remind and promote the use of face coverings throughout the school community, in addition to ensuring that students are clear when exemptions are in place (for example in PE lessons).

We have also been informed by the Department for Education that face coverings are not required to be worn when students are sitting examinations and formal assessments (although they can remain on if individuals choose to wear them.) Face coverings must be worn when entering and leaving exam rooms and we will issue all relevant students with clear guidance in their examination venue.

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Ambition

As well as a number of students being involved in external exams this week and next week, year 13 and year 11 students will be in the process of receiving their **mock exam results**. For year 11 students they will receive their full set of results in a Mock results day during tutor time on **Thursday 20th January**. These exams are an initial indicator of progress so far but they certainly do not reflect the final outcomes. It remains essential that Year 11 and 13 take every opportunity to study and revise both within and beyond the classroom. If the national climate's status quo remains then schools will remain fully open and exams will proceed as normal this summer.

Respect

Despite the restrictions that are currently in place, wearing masks means that all students can continue to access all food outlets across the school. I know that one of the drawbacks of being in bubbles last year was that not all students could access the main dining area and the delights that our catering team create on a weekly basis. In order to ensure that we show respect for each other and that all students can get through the queues at lunchtime it is important that students use their **card to pay for purchases.** This is an incredibly time efficient system. Since returning from the Christmas break it has become clear that a number of students are not using their card when purchasing items. Having to input the student name on the system and their year group takes much longer for the catering team and so service is being slowed. As a reminder students without cards will be asked to wait at the end of the queue. This should not be something that students take issue with as having a photo card is part of the equipment expected to have in school.

As a reminder students can buy replacement cards, if they have been lost, from the Finance Office for £5.
