As mentioned, despite the ending of legal restrictions over half term, schools (and communities as a whole) are still seeing high rates of infection. Our student attendance rates are back above the national average, which is a reassurance. However, staff absence due to Covid and other illness remains very high, and the availability of supply teachers is minimal. Although our staff are going out of their way to cover colleagues wherever possible, there is still a risk that we could have to make a decision to close to a year group on any particular day or combine classes in a larger space. This will always be a last resort but I would want families to be aware of the possible decisions that would need to be made in certain situations. Government guidance is due to be updated again on 1st April and if/when any protocols need to be changed, I will inform families as soon as possible.

Lost Property

Our Lost Property area is becoming very full, especially with coats. Please check with your child and if they are missing an item they can drop by before school, at break, lunch or after school and hopefully locate their lost item. Lost Property is by the Heads of House office. At the end of this term we will clear the lost property and donate any items to charity.

School transport

As mentioned Covid cases in the area are still high and I am aware some local schools are experiencing a high volume of cases amongst pupils. On school mini buses or coaches we recommend students continue to wear masks due to the enclosed environment, proximity and lack of ventilation. This will be reviewed following the next government update on 1st April.
