We were overwhelmed with the response to this appeal from families. The presents were collected last week and are currently making their way to the Romanian/Ukrainian border. I know they will be very gratefully received. Many thanks to all that contributed.

Year 11 and 13 November exams

Students will come to the end of their November exam period early next week and staff have been very pleased with how these have happened. Although an intense period for students, having these exams earlier in the term will mean that when classes return after Christmas staff will have marked the papers and have a clear plan in place for the remaining 5 months. As per our calendar although students return to school on Wednesday January 4th, staff will be in on the 3rd for an INSET day with a clear focus on exam class planning. Mock results for both year groups will be distributed on Thursday 15th December in tutor time.

Update to uniform systems and sanctions

Our uniform expectations are flexible to keep costs reasonable and to provide options for students. For example students can wear an all black trainer of one material or school shoe. We also allow coats to be worn in the building (not lessons) and developed a school fleece for students to wear as an additional layer. Full details of the uniform policy can be found here:

It has been disappointing to see a small number of students, despite this flexibility, to regularly push boundaries with uniform, choosing not to meet our expectations. As such, in the remaining weeks of this term ensuring consistency with uniform is our key focus and this will be accompanied by a new 3 level approach which will be shown via ClassCharts.

Level 1: If a student arrives in school with incorrect uniform their tutor will discuss a reasonable period within which this can be rectified. For example, if it is related to trousers that need to be purchased to replace leggings a 3-5 day turnaround for delivery will be agreed. Where the uniform can be instantly changed, for example removing a facial piercing or hooded jumper, this will be done immediately.

Level 2: This will occur when the tutor notices persistent breaches of the policy. Details of which will be placed on ClassCharts.

Level 3: Where uniform guidelines are continued to be ignored and not adhered to, students will be asked to return home and return to school in the correct uniform later that day. Parents will be notified by phone when this happens.

Naturally the last thing we would want is for students to miss time in school but as shown above as a school there are a number of opportunities presented to students for them to make the correct choice regarding uniform where this should not happen. Thanks, in advance, for your support with this matter.



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Our school car park is busy and at capacity for much of the school day. Unfortunately we are seeing an increasing number of parents

driving on to site to drop off or collect their child and recently there have been two alarming near misses between cars and pedestrians. A reminder that the car park should not be used to drop off or collect students. Students coming to school should be walking to and from a safe point outside of the school site accessing the school through the student pedestrian entrances.
