As parents are aware initial strike action is scheduled for Wednesday 1st February, with subsequent days being identified in March. Strikes are being held nationally and the action being taken is not related to issues specific to Nailsea School. I am currently working with staff in school to ascertain the implications this will have on the possibility of restricting student attendance on the day or if the school will need to close. Please be assured I am taking all reasonable steps to keep the school open for as many students as possible, but this will be determined by the number of staff that will be on site and not on strike on 1st February. I intend to share confirmed plans with all families next week. Thank you for understanding that this is a decision that does involve a large degree of planning and for your patience whilst such plans are put in place.

On these occasions students should remain in class or, if they are too unwell to stay in school report to reception to be sent home. They can not be 'treated' in First Aid.

Finally.... it was a surprise this week when New Zealand's prime minister, Jacinda Ardern, announced she was resigning.
