Use the watching and reading tasks to help you decide on your argument for the above statement. You can either agree or disagree, or give a balanced argument with both views. Remember to include examples from the films you have watched. Aim for 500 words.

Consider the following questions in your essay:

- Are modern films more predictable than Hollywood films from the 1930s-1960s?
- Why are mainstream films predictable? Are independent films less predictable?
- Explore a film you've seen recently that you think is original and creative

Challenge: Bring in the genre theories that you have learnt

Aim Higher Task: 30% of the Film Studies course is practical and involves script writing and film making. To help you practice your skills, you are going to make a 1 minute 'Lumiere Minute' film. Now it's your turn. Film the road outside your house from a window for just 1 minute, without moving the frame (no panning). Choose exactly the right moment to start recording your minute. Then 60 seconds later, stop the shot. No editing, no cheating!The point of this exercise is not to make 'funny short films' like on YouTube, but to try make the world visible, with brand new eyes. Each shot is a result of both choice - and luck. Give a title to your view (that describes the view, very simply).
