Autumnal Weather

With the weather changing and as we approach winter can I please remind families that

- Students cycling to school should be using lights and wearing a helmet and reflective clothing as the afternoons become darker.
- Students should be coming to school with a coat given the drop in temperatures and the rain that is likely.
- Certain areas outside the main school will be 'out of bounds' given the change in season. The
 back field is now closed until further notice, irrespective of daily weather conditions. Students
 can continue to access the hard courts for recreational purposes. During heavy rain students
 will also be reminded to stay in the building during breaktimes and lunchtimes.

Staff absences

On occasions, for reasons that are unavoidable, staff may not be in school and lessons will be covered by other staff. These lessons may be taken by existing staff or those from a supply agency. All staff that cover lessons will be asking students to continue their curriculum with work that would have been covered if their teacher was present. If any member of staff is off for a sustained period of time, a different approach is taken where timetables may be amended so that exam classes can be prioritised with existing staff that are subject specialists. I appreciate that neither of these options are ideal but please be assured departments are doing all they can to ensure that student experience is as best as it can be in the situation. 
