Dear Parents/carers

Well, in all honesty, we could have done with a slightly smoother to start to Term 5, couldn't we?

Since we were aware of the cyber attack in the last few days of the Easter break, staff on site have been working tirelessly with the external agencies to both contain and rectify the situation. I know that this has meant some decisions were thought to be at odds with the best interests of students, but we were acting directly on the advice of the experts in order to restore 'normal service' as soon as possible and to protect our systems moving forward.

I will continue to update you on progress as and when this is appropriate but following the first week back I would like to draw your attention to the following:

- Cashless Catering This is a service we have asked to be a priority to be restored. For the time being students will continue with the system of verbally telling staff the choices they have made at both break and lunchtime. Although the reduced offer will continue next week we are aiming to return to offering the main meal. Parents are being asked to continue to top up cards from home as the costs incurred are being deleted retrospectively from accounts on a daily basis. For information, it has been noticed that some students are spending considerably more than they normally would one student spent almost £10 on lunch on one day last week. I would urge that parents continue to monitor spending so that all purchases can be covered.
- Access to Office 365 This needed to be disabled this week in order to reissue passwords, given that any one of them may have been compromised in the attack. We have identified those students in years 10 13 who are studying courses that require the completion of coursework and these will be the priority group for restoring passwords next week. Given that our filtering systems cannot be in place on site for the time being students in this priority group will be able to access their accounts off site and will not be able to do this in school.
- Students taking examinations this year As part of the work this week, all exam boards have been made aware of our situation. Naturally we do not want any student to be disadvantaged for a situation that was beyond their control.

Year 9 vaccinations

These are due to take place next Wednesday, 24th April.



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As mentioned in a previous letter, although the main exams start from early May, practical exams conclude much earlier. Next week GCSE 3D Art and Fine Art will be completed, with GCSE Photography the following week.

Year 11 attended an assembly this week where the plans for the remaining 5 weeks were shared. As I said to my History group, we are very much at the 'business end' with, in options subjects a maximum of 15 lessons remaining. Staff have planned lesson by lesson content since January and so with continued focus and attendance in lessons, students will be fully prepared for the schedule ahead.
