

Uniform and jewellery reminders



I contacted you before the May half term being clear about jewellery, namely:

 Students are permitted to wear one pair of studs as earrings. Hoops will need to be removed if they are worn to school.

- If a metallic nose stud is seen in school, students will be asked to replace this with a clear plastic stud. Refusal to do so will mean that the student is placed in the internal exclusion room.
- All piercings need to be removed for PE lessons in adherence with health and safety guidelines.

In addition to this, there have been an increased number of students who are choosing to wear leggings to school instead of the stipulated black trousers. I will be contacting the families of the students that fall into this category, directly in the next few weeks to reiterate the importance of adhering to the very clear expectations set out on the website.
