We recently launched the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) to our Year 12 students and impressively over half of the year group have signed up to complete this additional qualification worth half an A-Level. Once a title is decided they will spend the remainder of Year 12 completing their project, before presenting it to the Sixth form team in the Autumn. Community Ambassadors



On Thursday 19 December, the Sixth Form held their annual Winter Ball at the pier, Weston-Super-Mare. Students dressed in their finery to celebrate the end of a very successful term and year. As with all Sixth Form social events, Year 13s were joined by Year 12s reflecting the community spirit of the Sixth Form. Dinner of fish and chips was eagerly received by students (and perhaps most of all by the teachers!). The DJ played a medley of tunes from Abba to Taylor Swift; the dance floor erupting into the Macarena was a sight to see. Students happily danced with different friendship groups and a joyful atmosphere meant that the night was a great source of entertainment.

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Religious Studies

In Term 3, students in Years 7-9 are studying various aspects of world religions. Year 7 is focusing on Judaism, building on previous work on Abraham and Moses.

Year 8's work on Christianity begins with exploring the problem of evil in Christianity, while Year 9 is examining arguments for God's existence such as the cosmological and design arguments. They have been introduced to the 'Masters of Suspicion' philosophers such as Marx, Freud, and Nietzsche.

Having been taught the two branches of Christianity and Ethics, the introduction of Philosophy is giving students a broad understanding of belief and practice.

Drama Update

This term can be encapsulated by a noticeable rise in students' confidence, a determination to work through the difficulties and complexities of the subject, and the embracing of all that Drama has to offer.

Year 7 and 8's study of the play, 'The Perfectly Timed Death of an Imaginary Friend', and 'Chorus' respectively, has continued during this term. Students in both years have been challenged to use the techniques that were established in Term 2 at developing levels of complexity. In Year 7, this has meant that students have been returning to the technique of Hots eating to ensure that their characterisation is developing in line with how their character evolves throughout the play. In Year 8, our study of the 'Chorus' within Greek Theatre, from where the technique originated, has developed into exploring how the idea of Chorus has been used through theatre history, including in plays by Shakespeare and contemporary playwrights. This exploration will result in students developing their own Chorus speech and utilising Chorus techniques in its rehearsal and performance.



In Year 9, we have recently moved onto exploring the style of Physical Theatre. This has been a very new concept, and vastly different to students' expectations of Drama. Physical Theatre is a key focus in GCSE Drama, during which students must devise their own original piece of work. This unit has focused on the notable practitioner, Frantic Assembly, and their work on the renowned play adaptation of 'The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time'. Not only are students exploring how to convey relationships, connection, story, and meaning through physicality alone but, by focusing on this particular play, the emphasis of Terms 1 and 2 on understanding and responding to social context is maintained. As we continue to introduce students to new, challenging, and interesting ways of making and thinking about theatre, the Drama department here at Nailsea is increasingly impressed by the growth, determination, and tenacity that students show in their study of the subject.

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Developing Education in Nature

The DEN is a wildlife area near the entrance of Nailsea School site which is in need a of a makeover. Pupils and staff have been encouraged to think what they can do to help turn the DEN into an 'outdoor classroom'. We are grateful to Pheonix House who has donated funds from their charity week to help turn ideas into a reality. Some of the money has been spent on paint in the four house colours to decorate signs, tables, tyre planters and more. We were also successful in our funding bid from Nature Grants last term, who have donated vegetable and wildflower seeds to promote biodiversity and some benches to create social spaces. They have also provided a 'fire kit' to use with the existing fire pit and are offering training to staff in March on fire safety and outdoor learning opportunities.

Pupils in all year groups have been invited to spend Thursday lunch breaks to start decorating signs and tyre planters. As well as carrying out manual tasks like cutting back overgrown plants they have shared their ideas on how to improve the space. For example, we would also like to create a small fairy garden with small ornaments and found objects to bring a bit of magic to the garden. We would also like to create a wildlife area with log piles, bug hotels and a small pond. Pupils were delighted when last week a baby newt was discovered under an old planter, showing that the DEN is already a haven for wildlife.

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Modern Foreign Languages - French

Year 7 – **Mon collège** Year 7 French students are learning all about the topic of school this term. What are the main differences between French and English schools? Students are learning how to articulate what their favourite lesson is in French and why, expressing different views on their subjects as well as describing their school day and timetable. Telling the time features significantly so we are able to say in French what time the school day starts and finishes eloquently.

Year 8 – **Mon identité** Year 8 French linguists unpick everything about themselves and what makes them unique in Term 3. They learn to describe their personality in more detail, who they get on well with (and don't!), music and clothes. Students are building up to describing what they might wear to a party or on the weekend, successfully showing they are able to use the future tense in their learning.



Year 9 – **A l'horizon** Year 9 French students are delving into all things career related this term, learning how to say what job we would like to do in the future and why. We take time to explore why it is important to learn a language other than our mother tongue and the different job prospects this can open up for us. We cover some challenging concepts of the imperfect and simple future tenses so we are able to articulate what we wanted to be when we were younger and what we will do in the future. Le monde c'est à nous!

Year 10 - **Ma vie scolaire** Year 10 are immersing themselves in all things related to school, from subjects and timetables to their everyday school experiences. Students are comparing subjects, discuss what their school day looks like and the differences in other francophone countries, as well as sharing opinions on teachers and school rules (fingers crossed for positive feedback!). It's a great topic for students to connect their language learning to a relatable subject.

Year 11 - **Un oeil sur le monde** Year 11 linguists have reflected on their Mock exams before moving onto talk about the environment. Students are exploring global issues while also discussing solutions and actions that can make a difference. This ranges from climate change to global charity work. It's an engaging and thought-provoking way to link language learning with real-world awareness.

Finally, it was great to see so many students have a go at the Wessex Translation Bee before Christmas. Students had to translate as many words as they could in 1 minute. We had some incredible scores. The top scorers will be going through to Round 2 at Kings of Wessex in Term 4.

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YEAR 7 SCIENCE FAIR

Year 7 have spent an exciting term working on their Science Fair projects, putting their creativity, curiosity, and teamwork to the test. The results were fantastic! They have been working collaboratively to plan, design and carry out their own science projects, and we have seen great participation this year with many unique and interesting projects. The Science Fair is an opportunity for students to look at and engage with the science that they are most interested in. The attitude and effort put in by students this year has been excellent, with a special mention to the finalists who did an amazing job presenting and discussing their projects with teachers and peers.


Alongside the Science Fair, during their topic lessons, Year 7 have been studying reproduction, learning about how life begins and develops. Whilst in physics, they have been investigated forces, gravity, friction, and air resistance.















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Science Update

Year 8 tackled reactions and separation techniques, learning how substances interact and how we can isolate specific components from mixtures. They also explored the fascinating properties of light, investigating reflection, refraction, and colour.

Year 9 have been delving into quantitative chemistry, plant biology, and kinetic theory. They explored the importance of photosynthesis, how substances travel in plants, and the impact of plant diseases. They also began mastering the calculations essential for understanding chemical reactions and investigated two methods for determining density.

Year 10 biologists finished their studies on organisation, examining how organs and systems work together to keep us alive. Now, they've moved on to the microscopic world of the immune system, discussing how the body defends itself against disease. So far, their studies have ranged from white blood cells engulfing pathogens to the science behind vaccines. In Physicists in Year 10s have been learning about the core concepts in electricity and how current, potential difference and resistance behave in series and parallel circuits. Year 10 Chemists are currently making their way through the exciting topic of chemical changes, with lots of opportunity for hands on practical work and some tricky concepts moving electrons around in reactions.

Year 11 biologists have finished their deep dive into inheritance and genetics, where they explored how traits are passed down through generations and how DNA determines everything from eye colour to inherited diseases. Now, they're diving into variation and evolution, discovering how small genetic changes can shape the incredible diversity of life around us. With topics like natural selection and selective breeding, students are exploring the bigger picture of how species evolve and succeed in ever-changing environments. Year 11 Physics students are approaching the end of the Waves topic where they have been looking at which materials are the best emitters and absorbers of infrared radiation, and in Year 11 Chemistry, students are wrapping up their studies of Paper 2 chemistry including rates of reaction, organic chemistry, resources, analysis and the atmosphere ready for their paper 2 practice exams. We will then be moving on with revision before the countdown to final exams begins.

Year 12 biologists have finished their topic on gas exchange and are now moving into cell division, preparing for a practical root tip squash investigation to observe mitosis in action. In Physics, Year 12's have been learning about the properties of materials and how Engineers will choose which material is best suited for certain uses. Year 12 chemists have completed the foundation in chemistry module and have now started to study organic chemistry and inorganic chemistry. Students have completed practical lessons including synthesising different organic compounds such as haloalkanes. They have also begun to explore the idea of enthalpy within chemical reactions.


Year 13 students have been studying epigenetics, investigating how gene expression is influenced by environmental factors. This includes thinking how changes in gene expression are linked to diseases like cancer. In Physics, Year 13 have finished their unit of Nuclear Physics where they have been using binding energy to explain how energy is released in nuclear reactions. Year 13 Chemists are studying how we piece together what molecules are made up of using a wide range of analysis techniques including NMR spectroscopy. On the other side they are learning about the fascinating topic of transition metals and an introduction to the vast range of reactions that inorganic compounds take part in. We have one entrant this year for the chemistry Olympiad, a notoriously tough test of Y12, Y13 and undergraduate level chemistry and maths. Watch this space for the results when they are published!

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STEM Club


STEM Club have had an exciting start to the year, with the greatest number of regular attendees ever seen. We have spent time doing code-breaking treasure hunts, and the club broke into groups completed projects debunking popular science conspiracy theories. We have also made batteries from scratch using metal-acid components and vegetables!




Before Christmas we attempted to make decorations from salt crystals but this went hilariously wrong generating the largest salt-covered crystals on every piece of equipment, except the decorations themselves! This term we have had a competition to design and build gliders to carry eggs safely to the ground. Unfortunately, most groups seem to have included ejector seats in their glider designs resulting in many an eggy impact with the ground while the gliders soared overhead!

Geography

Year 7 have been working hard on their Storms that Stole Christmas assessment, which brings together their knowledge on the causes, consequences and responses to storms, which is very topical at the moment! They have used evidence from a documentary, as well as their knowledge of low-pressure systems to write an extended piece of writing, highlighting their abilities. We've been 'blown away' by their reports!









Year 8 are coming to the end of their rivers and coastal topic. They have been learning about the hydrological cycle, and the geomorphic processes of rivers and coasts and how they shape our land. We have been reading some excellent extended writing on the Tewkesbury floods, in which students have been considering whether these were caused naturally or by humans.

Year 9 have completed their topic on the tropical rainforests. They have produced some fantastic poster presentations about these biomes and as well as investigating and writing about the causes and consequences of deforestation, and why this is such a complex issue. Again, some fantastic work has been completed for which students should be really proud of themselves.

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


Slapton Trip January 2024

Year 12 Geography students have completed their fieldwork residential at Slapton Field Studies Centre in Devon. Students travelled to Slapton on Sunday the 19th January and straight away began their fieldwork creating enquiry questions and collecting data about the village of Slapton. The following two days were spent practising fieldwork techniques for coasts and place studies. Students then decide what they would like to investigate for their coursework, and independently collected data for an enquiry question of their choice.

We were blessed with dry weather and great food. The students worked exceptionally hard, and on one night worked until nearly 10pm to perfect their research questions. The staff at the field study centre commented on what a great bunch of students they were, being positive, polite, and aspiring high. We can't wait to see the finished outcomes of their coursework.

English Department Update

In English, we started off the new year by hitting the ground running. Year 7 students studied the novel *Bone Talk*, which was new on the curriculum last year and became an instant favourite. We've enjoyed watching the students fall in love with the Bontok tribe and our main characters Samkad and Luki.

In Year 8, students have continued to develop their writing skills by turning their attention to non-fiction opinion article writing. In this unit, students read a range of experiential writings by people who participate in extreme sport. After learning from their writing style, students then develop their own opinion article arguing for or against participation in extreme sport.

This term, Year 9 have been exploring a range of poems about empowerment by poets such as Maya Angelou and Wilfred Owen. This unit culminates in a comparison of how poets present this theme, with opportunities thrown in for students to develop their own poetry writing as well.

Our Year 10 students continued their study of fiction to prepare them for their English Language GCSE. They read a range of extracts and considered how writers craft their work. Students have now turned their focus to the Poetry Anthology unit where they study a wide range of poems, both old and new, considering the theme of power and conflict.

Year 11 have finished learning everything they need for their English Language and Literature GCSEs and we are now working together to revise everything they've learnt over the last two years so that they are confident and prepared for the exam period.

We're so proud of how hard the Year 11s are working and what they know and can do.

Revision methods are taught by all Maths teachers in their lessons.

Look on Class charts Maths homework printout for a roundup of the term's Maths week by week: then you can read up ahead if trying to help. Some Maths methods have changed 'since our day'

Don't say: 'Oh I hated

Maths at school' 'I was

never any good at it'
because your child will
think the same, and lose
motivation.

Show your child how to lay numbers and methods out neatly on the page - show your workings - you can get marks even if the answer is wrong.

Look online for help: find videos and solving methods on Corbett Maths / Maths Pad / BBC Bitesize

Parents: avoid arguments while you're helping...it will leave you both dreading Maths if you let this happen.

Stick to time recommended for the homework, if it's 30mins, really focus for 30mins, try your hardest, but don't drag it out and make a painful memory of Maths. Write down on the book what you managed to do in that time, this gives your teacher a good sense of progress.





It's been a busy term with a number of Careers focussed events as well as lots of classroom based learning.

We're particularly grateful for the number of professionals that have been in school sharing their expertise. This term each of our Year 13 students has been through a rigorous mock interview, the students have been tasked with meeting the independent experts to hone their interview skills ready for the next steps whether that's work, education or a mixture of them both.

We've also enjoyed the company of the unbelievably energetic and inspirational Junior Saunders as well as the Weston Training Provider Network who shared their wisdom on how to apply for apprenticeships.

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Media and Film Studies Round Up

Y10 Media have started studying the Post Office Scandal as this is on the two front pages of the newspapers they have to study for their exam. Students are watching the first episode of Mr Bates V The Post Office ITV drama to understand the emotions and real-life consequences of the Horizon computer system failure.

Y11 Media have been learning about music videos, in particular the Arctic Monkeys and Black Pink. They are contrasting the authentic, organic nature of Arctic Monkeys with the more commercialised K-Pop group. As part of this unit, students have been exploring how the internet revolutionised the way in which bands were marketed. They have been learning about the early days of social media and peer-2-peer networking via My Space and Napster.

Y11 Film are starting their last film of the course – Danny Boyle's Slumdog Millionaire. The fragmented narrative is proving interesting for them and this is one of the focuses for the film in the exam. They are also working on their last draft of their coursework – their deadline is the end of this term.

Magazines, in particular GQ have been the area of study for Y12 Media. They are looking at how mainstream media represents masculinity and have been exploring how masculinity is evolving.

Y13 Media students have been captured by Martians! Not really, but they have been studying the 1938 radio adaptation of War of the Worlds by Orson Welles. They have explored how the political and social context of the Munich Crisis and Hindenburg disaster created a condition of consumption that led to people believing the myth. Newspapers of the day manipulated the radio performance to their advantage and exploited the situation in headlines on 'terrified' people. Y13 Film students continue to work on their short film – there are some excellent performances from family and friends in them! They are finishing up their study of the set texts, having explored the documentary Amy.

Health and Social Care - Year 12 First Aid Training

This term, our Year 12 Health and Social Care students have taken part in First Aid training with a paramedic. They have had the opportunity to apply their classroom learning of anatomy and physiology to understand and develop their practical skills. By the end of the session, students felt confident in CPR of both babies and adults, and in how to use a defibrillator. Students also learned how to save someone's life if they were choking, through providing back blows and the Heimlich Manoeuvre. Finally, students learned how to treat a catastrophic bleed in an emergency situation, including using a tourniquet, chest seal and apply bandages.

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Information Technology News

Extra Curricular: Computing club is held on a Wednesday lunch time in room 155. Year 7 and 8 students are working in teams for the Young Coders challenge. Students around the country are creating games to fit this years theme of "Budgeting better". Year 9 students are also welcome to attend and work on their coding skills. Period 6 has also been a great success so far this year with Year 10 and Year 11 students making excellent progress towards their coursework. Period 6 for IT takes place on a Monday after school, all Year 10 and 11 students who take IT are welcome to attend.

Year 7 students have been working on their coding skills in scratch, producing some fun and interesting quizzes. They have now moved on to spreadsheets where they are exploring the ways in which spreadsheets can be used in real life and working on a range of formulas, functions and validation.

Year 8 students have recently completed a Python programming unit in which they created an Adventure Game using Bear Grylls You vs Wild as inspiration. We had some really creative stories that drew on both their programming knowledge and their ability to think outside of the box. Students have now moved on to using a pocket sized computer called a Microbit to create a range of devices included a fastest reaction game.

Year 9 students have been getting creative in Sonic Pi, using programming to create computer generated music. It has been a real highlight listening to the music they have made and seeing how they haven't been afraid to take some risks and experiment with a new piece of software.

Year 10 and 11 have been busy working on their coursework on spreadsheets. Students have been using a range of complex functions, validation, pivot tables, macros and security measures to create professional and functional spreadsheets. We have been really impressed with how students have taken on the challenge and seeing their confidence grow each week with the skills they have learnt is a joy.

Thank you! - A big thank you to the PTA for funding an online revision tool which is currently being used by Year 11 in preparation for their exam and will shortly be used by Year 10 to help support them with their theory. Erevision is a really valuable tool that allows students to use a range of activities to help consolidate the knowledge they are learning in lessons.
