


### **English Update**





### **Our Triwizard Tournament Adventure at Warner Bros. Studios**

During CEW, our lucky students stepped through the magical gates of Warner Bros. Studios for a memorable experience at The Making of Harry Potter, and what an unforgettable day it was! As the coach pulled into Leavesden Studios, the excitement was already crackling in the air – as if someone had waved a wand and cast Expecto Excitementum! But this wasn't just any studio tour. This was the Triwizard Tournament Special, and from the very first moment, we knew we were in for something extraordinary.

The spirit of international magical cooperation was alive and well as we were welcomed with a dazzling performance from the ladies of Beauxbatons Academy of Magic. Not to be outdone, the Durmstrang Institute Quidditch team made a dramatic entrance – all fire and foot-stomping swagger, twirling staffs and looking as though Viktor Krum himself might be leading the way. It felt like we'd stepped straight into the pages of Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire.

With the Triwizard Tournament in full swing, our students were invited to try their hand at some magical challenges. First up? Broomstick flying lessons, led by experts who might as well have graduated from Madam Hooch's very own flying school. With safety harnesses securely fastened (we're still working on getting our Hogwarts flying licenses), our brave young wizards soared into the air, wind rushing past them as they posed like Seeker champions chasing after a glimmering Golden Snitch. For a few magical moments, they were part of the Quidditch World Cup, imagining the roar of the crowd, the beat of the Bludgers, and the gleam of the Cup within reach.

Next, it was off to board the Hogwarts Express itself on Platform 9%. Stepping onto the iconic scarlet train was like stepping back in time to Harry's very first journey to Hogwarts. ### From 'Grey to Green' - Green Fingers in The Courtyard

As part of this year's Curriculum Enrichment Week, pupils in Years 7-9 took part in a carousel of Green Fingers workshops. The sessions included:

- 1. British Wildlife (learning about trees, birds and other animals through quizzes and games)
- 2. Habitat Mapping (exploring the DEN and mapping the different habitats)
- 3. Grey to Green (improving the biodiversity and appearance of The Courtyard)

Nailsea School is lucky to have a large south-facing courtyard that backs onto the school field. During an audit of the biodiversity of the school site it was noted that this area has lots of potential but until recently only had one raised bed with a tree and weeds growing in it

Tutor groups completed a survey about how they would like to see the area improved, with suggestions of adding planters, bird boxes and bug hotels, water features etc. The makeover of The Courtyard area will be a long term project, but we started by cutting back the overhanging wisteria and pruning the roses on the existing pergola. Using some funding from the Nailsea Horticultural Society we add flowers such as lavender, salvia and yellow daisies to the central raised bed.

Due to a limited budget we decided to make our own planters, rather than buying them ready made. We bought the wood from the local company, Fountain Timber, who also kindly donated four pallets that we painted in the four house colours. The plan is for the pallets to be turned into wall-hung planters to create a 'green wall' for growing strawberries and other small plants.

Another local community group, The Nailsea Shedders, helped to design the planters, precut the wood to size and then pre-drill the holes. This meant that pupils were able to quickly assemble two planters in one morning under their expert supervision. Students enjoyed using the power tools and seeing the planters take shape. The 2 planters have now been painted yellow (Phoenix House) and blue (Unicorn House) and are being filled with compost and plants. We hope to make the remaining two more planters next year for Griffin and Dragon house when more funds can be raised to cover the cost of the timber.

We hope that pupils enjoyed their time learning outside and getting their hands dirty doing the practical tasks. With students being involved in the making and planting of this area it will give them more 'ownership' of the space and a realisation of the effort that goes into making outdoor spaces attractive to both people and wildlife. We couldn't have done this project without the support from the local community groups, as well as internal funding from Phoenix and Unicorn House. Thank you for helping to make 'The Courtyard' a greener space!

### **Personal Development Curriculum**

#### Year 7

This term, Year 7 explored the foundations of a fair society, including democracy, the rule of law, and individual freedoms. They also took part in a finance session introducing key money management skills.

#### Year 8

#### Year 9

#### Year 10

This term, Year 10 focused on health and wellbeing. They examined how media influences health choices, created meal and fitness plans on a budget, and reflected on holistic wellbeing—mind, body, and spirit.

#### **PSHE Lessons**

This term in PSHE lessons, students across Years 7 to 9 have been applying their learning through exciting, computer-based Citizenship projects.

#### ∕ear 7

Year 7 created and presented their own School Debate Shows, exploring key issues around fairness, rights, and responsibilities in a school setting.

#### Year 8

Year 8 designed Justice System Awareness Campaigns to educate others about youth crime, positive choices, and how the legal system supports rehabilitation.

#### Year 9

Year 9 stepped into the shoes of future MPs by creating their own Election Campaigns, reflecting on real-world issues, personal values, and how parliamentary democracy works.

### **Geography Summer of Fieldwork**

Year 7s have been investigating whether Nailsea is a clone town or home town as part of their People and Place topic. During Term 6 our students have been completing fieldwork on the high street and, using a quantitative fieldwork technique, they have been counting the number of chain and independent stores. We have then analysed this data, and using a formula from the New Economics Foundation to work out if Nailsea is unique (home town) or like other towns in our countries (clone town).

#### Year 8

Year 8s have been investigating why natural places are important to us, in their Threatened Environments topic. As such they have been completing fieldwork in the Den area of our school and studying different environments, (pond, meadow and woodland) to determine their environmental quality. Using an environmental quality assessment, students have determined which environments mean more to us, and why our answers to this question can be so different.

#### Year 9 Fieldwork

Year 9s have also been investigating Nailsea High Street, this time assessing whether the High Street is dying? We are collecting fieldwork along with the other Wessex Learning Trust schools to determine how thriving our High Street is. Students have been collecting data on the number of vacant shops, the footfall, and completing an environmental quality assessment. We can then compare our results to Cheddar and Street to see how our high streets compare.

#### Year 10 Fieldwork

Year 10 students have completed fieldwork for their GCSE on coastal processes and management at Sandbay. We were incredibly lucky to have two days of sunny weather. Students completed bi polars of sea defences, as well as completing CISAs on cliff stability, and land use survey. This data will be analysed back in class to determine how effective coastal management is, as well as how stable the cliffs are at Sand Bay. Students will use this data to answer fieldwork questions in their mock and June exams.





## NEWS ATTACK OF THE CLONE TOWNS



ocal high streets which are driving out small, often family owned shops in town across the UK, a survey has suggested.

According to research conducted by the New Economics Foundation, 40% of the nation's high streets have become "clone towns".

This means that "the individuality of high street shops has been replaced by a monochrome strip of global and national chains" and that many towns have become "somewhere that could easily be mistaken for dozens of bland town centres across the country".


A further 26% of towns were on the border of becoming clones, while just 33% were identified in the survey as "home towns" - where a town has "retained its individual character and is instantly recognisable and distinctive to the people who live there, as well as to those who visit".


The creep of huge retail companies on to town centres across the UK does have its benefits. Some people enjoy the choice of goods and competitive prices offered by chain stores.

### Celebrating Success at the Wessex Learning Trust Translation Bee Finals 2025

This year's Wessex Learning Trust Translation Bee has been an exciting journey of language, learning, and linguistic talent, and it all came to a thrilling conclusion with the finals at Bath Spa University at the start of Term 6.

The Translation Bee is a high-speed translation competition run across the academic year, with three stages of increasing difficulty. In the autumn term, pupils tackled 40 key words and phrases in their school-based heats. The top linguists then progressed to the Cheddar Valley round in the spring term, hosted at Kings Academy, where they competed against peers from across the Trust using a new bank of 30 phrases. The most successful pupils from each year group and language made it through to the final stage.

Pupils were treated to a tour of the university and took part in engaging enrichment sessions led by Bath Spa's PGCE trainees, gaining an inspiring glimpse into life as a language learner beyond school. The university's MFL lecturer praised all pupils for their impressive performance and outstanding pronunciation.



### **Work Experience**

Alexa, Ella, Jess & Eloise spent 3 days working alongside Mrs Davies for their work experience. The Year 12 students are interested in careers in media, photography and journalism, as part of the opportunity the students interviewed staff and students to write the following articles.

#### Local Students Feather their Nest at Squarebird

Sixth Form students and Year 10 students at Nailsea School visited Squarebird as a part of their work experience into the marketing and design agency sector.

Heather Church, Project Manager at Squarebird, was asked what working at Squarebird entails. In reply, Heather spoke about the varied, global companies that they produce web designs for, such as Thatcher's and a university in Japan, commenting that the company puts an emphasis on how Squarebird takes time to deeply understand their clients' wants and needs.

With the main office being located in Nailsea, Heather spoke about the Nailsea community "The Nailsea and Bristol community is important to us". When asked "why did you agree to work with Nailsea School students?" Heather told us that each year, Squarebird take on students for Work Experience, however because of its ten-year anniversary, Squarebird wanted to take on 10 students for work experience, linking to Squarebird's company values by helping the local community. "We would be happy to help the local talent" said Heather. In the work experience, Heather told us that students get a one to one conversation with experts which then opens student's eyes to new experiences and if this is the field they want to go into.

Two Nailsea School students: Eleanor and Erin, both have an interest in web design and are currently completing work experience with Squarebird which they are finding "interesting and useful" due to the detailed conversations with staff members.

In addition, Nick Bird (one of the founders of Squarebird, alongside his brother Jon) spoke to us about his prior experiences working with premium brands like BMW, which inspired him to start his own company with Jon, who was working in a management consulting firm. Nick comments that the beginning of Squarebird was initially challenging as they started with no clients and were "working till 3'oclock in the morning" due to him working alongside his regular job. However, before long Squarebird grew from only a few clients to many, with them now having clients all over the world.

#### **Pathways Day**

Nailsea School Sixth Form had the privilege to welcome individuals from a number of universities and companies to enlighten students about potential career options. With these 'Pathways' sessions, students got the chance to gain an insight into any potential next steps that they may wish to pursue.

The 'Pathways' sessions were introduced, not only decide what career fields or university courses students might enjoy, but also help to develop transferable skills through engaging the students. The students were provided with wider knowledge on transferable skills that they could implement in any future interviews that they will undergo in the foreseeable future. The subjects on offer ranged from law to creative arts allowing all students to feel included in their interests.

After asking the students that attended what they liked about the sessions, one student replied that "It helped me to decide what is the best fit for me," differentiating between potential options they do and do not want to pursue. Another student enjoyed the "hands on experience in some of the sessions," such as: "the hair and prosthetics session." because "this allowed me to fully dive into what the course could look like for me." The students enthusiastically agreed they would "definitely" attend these sessions again given the opportunity.

With students feeling the pressure to decide their future, the sessions have helped to take some of the weight off their shoulders and reassure them that they can change their mind about what careers they would like to go into. Parents' have also expressed their encouragement for the decisions their children have made from their experiences.

The day was a beneficial factor in helping students feel confident in taking the next steps of their future. Nailsea School has been incredibly grateful for the encouragement and help offered to their students and hope to continue this enrichment day for future generations of students.

### **Duke of Edinburgh Awards**

It has been another busy year of developing skills, physical activity and volunteering alongside completing expeditions for an unprecedented 140 students across Years 9, 10 and 12 who are undertaking their Bronze, Silver and Gold Duke of Edinburgh awards. It has been fantastic checking the D of E app and seeing the progress pupils are making towards their independent sections as well as supporting and preparing students with their training for their expeditions.



#### **Bronze**

92 Students completed their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh training and expedition during curriculum enrichment week in a change to the model that we have followed in previous years to accommodate the growing numbers seeking the opportunity the award offers. From Monday to Wednesday students were based in school and around the local area developing their map reading, route planning, first aid and team building skills. They then had to put the skills they had developed to the test with their qualifying walk. All students met in Burrington Combe on Thursday morning and either travelled West over Black Down or South via Cheddar Gorge to Petruth Paddocks where they camped overnight. Staff from JC adventures who support expeditions commented on how professionally and accomplished groups navigated their routes and coped with the warm temperatures. Pupils conducted themselves impeccably overnight and packed away the campsite in record time on Friday morning to set off before the high temperatures took hold. The positivity and support that groups showed each other throughout the five days was wonderful to observe and students should be very proud of what they were able to achieve individually and as a group.









#### Silver

Our Silver students completed their practice expedition from the 15th –17th May in glorious sunshine on Exmoor. The groups set off from Wheddon Cross and the weather conditions remained fabulous (if a little warm for some pupils) for the duration of their three days and many students were delighted to reach the finishing point (and ice cream shop) in Lynmouth on the Saturday afternoon. Students shared highlights of paddling their feet in Badgeworthy Water that passes through Cloud Farm their campsite for night two whilst others discussed a rare cuckoo and adder sighting before being greeted by new-born calves at Westermill Campsite on day one as their personal highlights. Mr Payne – who tail walked the entire route over the three days captured the beautiful picture below on the second evening looking out over Lorna Doone Valley. The four Silver groups undertook their qualifying expedition from the 3rd – 5th July on Dartmoor.

The groups' route took them from South Brent to Haytor Rocks notably stopping off at Dartmeet, Bellever, Postbridge and Hound Tor en route. This marks the third year Nailsea have successfully run the Silver award 'in house,' and their external assessors who join only to assess the groups competence on expedition, noted the abilities and resilience as well as aptitude with navigation that the groups this year displayed particularly on the final day when the weather gods chose to throw a typical Dartmoor day of rain and low visibility making navigating particularly challenging. However, following five days of glorious weather on both their practice and qualifying expeditions up until this point it felt only right that students had one last challenge to finish! Well done to all students on being the most positive and supportive Silver cohort in my time leading the award.

#### Gold

The Gold Duke of Edinburgh award has returned to Nailsea this year with two groups who undertook their practice expedition on Dartmoor at the start of July in challengingly warm conditions. Working in preparation for their four day & three night qualifying expedition in September to the Brecon Beacons. Alongside their expedition and the three independent sections that students complete at the Bronze and Silver level of the award, students at Gold also have to seek and arrange their own five day residential. Students in this cohort have sought a wide and varied range of activities for this section, including bushcraft and wilderness skills in Yorkshire; woodland conservation and management in Kent; Army cadet training in Surry and some pupils will even be travelling overseas during the summer to complete animal conservation in Sri Lanka and adventurous activities in the French Alps.


### **Library News**
