Dear Parents/carers

I hope things are well with you all. At Nailsea, we are so fortunate to have such a positive and resilient community of parents and carers and, despite the challenges, we are all working together to ensure that remote education, pastoral care and in school provision are as effective as they can possibly be. Thanks again for all of the positive feedback and emails – this does really mean a lot to us.

Remote Learning

As you will have seen from my previous letter this week we are in the process of some essential maintenance with the Teams system and so lessons today (22nd Jan) and Monday (25th Jan) will be accessed only through Show My Homework. I will be updating everyone again on Monday.

As students in KS3 (years 7, 8 and 9) will have reported we are now reverting back to the 'Live Event' method of delivery for these lessons.

Next week, will be week B1 on the timetable. The timetable for next week is attached and from next week all the timetables will be on the website for reference.

As a school we are planning to send both a parent and student survey out with my letter next week to ascertain the techniques that are working well and the things that could improve. It would be great if as many people as possible could complete this next week.

As a reminder, when students return to school, the plan is that year groups will need to be tested and to ensure the process is as smooth as possible when we are dealing with full year groups, we are asking for consent to given in advance. Students over 16 years of age can provide their own consent but the form will still need to be completed in order to gather key information for the registration process.

On government advice, we will no longer be undertaking daily tests for those staff or students who have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive. Staff will have to follow Public Health advice and self Isolate at home, as directed by Test and Trace. Contacts will be informed as and when necessary.

Students wishing to access school site

Students who are children of critical workers and those vulnerable students can be supervised on school site for the period of wider school closure.

As a reminder, students need to be booked into this provision and cannot simply arrive at school. This is to ensure that we have the correct ratio of staff to students and that those students entitled to free school meals have been allocated them.

The booking form for wk comm 25th January closed last weekend. If the situation for families has changed and places need to be booked in this provision since the closure, all enquiries should be directed to nailsch@nailseaschool.com Spaces can only be allocated for this period if they are available.

The booking form for the final two weeks of term will be available in this letter next Friday.

Qualifications 2021 update

There is no doubt that the media coverage regarding this issue can create anxiety and possibly hamper what it is our students should be focusing on in the coming weeks.

The broad principles, whilst the consultation is 'live' are:

- Grades are 'still to play for', awarded through teacher assessment judgements
- Curriculum content and assessments will continue as planned through remote learning
- There are likely to be some questions set by the exam boards.
- Students should continue to focus on work completion, engagement with remote learning and giving their best efforts – this is the best way to guarantee success.

I will update students and parents as soon as we have concrete information on any detailed arrangements but I am confident that if these principles are followed students will achieve the grades they deserve in their 2021 qualifications.
