Dear Parents/Carers

Another busy week as we head to the end of term 3 and there is no let up next week! As mentioned in last week's letter, next Thursday and Friday we will be holding interviews for the Deputy Head teacher position at the school and I will be able to update you all on this important appointment for the school in my final letter of term on 18th February.

In order to continue to be transparent, we have just over 2% of the school that are currently Covid positive. Many thanks to the families that are continuing to use the c19@nailseaschool.com email address to notify us of any possible and confirmed cases. As a reminder, students who are isolating will access work through ClassCharts and this will be set from the day after the school is notified.

We do have a number of students coming to First Aid each day with Covid like symptoms. For those students where parents have previously given consent to in school testing, we may ask if the student is happy to do a Lateral Flow Test in the First Aid room. If the result is negative and the student is not feeling too poorly they will then be able to return to lessons. If you have previously given consent but now feel you would rather not have your child tested in school please email nailsch@nailseaschool.com to withdraw your consent.

Our school mobile phone policy is 'Off and Away for the whole school day' and for the last two weeks of term we are resetting expectations of this with students so that from term 4 the procedure is very clear. I know students will have phones to enable contact with home, especially if travelling to school separately, as well as some liking to monitor ClassCharts. However, over the last few weeks there have been some isolated incidents of phones being used during the school day that have led to learning being disrupted and parents being contacted following a break of the school expectations.

For clarity, as soon as the school day starts (8:35 am bell sounding) phones will need to be away and in bags. If phones are seen during the rest of the school they will be confiscated. Students will be expected to hand the phone over to the member of staff without argument. The phone will be returned at the end of the school day and should be collected from the Heads of House office. Any persistent offenders will be contacted by the Head of House and alternative arrangements made, such as the phone being deposited with the pastoral office for the school day when the student arrives in school on a daily basis.

Phones have become a really important part of our lives in the 21st century but direct conversation and social skills are also really important and should be developed, away from looking at screens. Thank you for your support with this very clear school policy.


Finally...
