What's Happening in Music this Term

Year 7 students are exploring different musical structures, playing everything from the tetris theme (binary form), star wars (ternary form) and pop songs (including Dua Lipa and Bastille) as a whole class band

Year 8 students are learning about traditional Indian classical music, and have composed their own raga scales and tala patterns. They are then going to experiment with musical fusion - adding drum loops, vocals and more to their group performances.

Year 9 students are using the programme Garageband on the computer to create minimalist pieces of music inspired by composers like Phillip Glass as well as minimal techno and dance producers.

Choir have started the song 'As it Was' by Harry Styles in two part harmony, and are sounding amazing already!



Jazz Band are learning the Ray Charles classic 'Hit The Road Jack' with some fantastic singers, rhythm section and wind/brass parts (although more wind/brass players would be very welcome!)

Orchestra are learning a lovely arrangement of John Lennon's beautiful song 'Imagine'

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Chemistry Olympiad - Gold





Congratulations to Harry T, Harry L and Mikey A on achieving a Gold Award in this years' International Chemistry Olympiad.

The Chemistry Olympiad is designed to stretch A level Chemistry students beyond the scope of what they would normally learn within the specification. It combines some very tricky Maths aspects with university level chemistry content and this year focused on rocket fuels, electronegativity, amino acid complexes, vaping and cheese!

Nearly 12,000 students participated with only 9% achieving a gold award, so the difficulty of these papers cannot be underestimated and the boys should be very proud of their achievements.

Coming along well for success next year were Y12 students Tom R, Dexter G, Josh L, and Jacob S who all were awarded bronze. This is particularly notable as they have only covered half of the A level syllabus at this point and are showing great resilience to attempt these papers. Well done to all and good luck to our Y13's in their upcoming Chemistry exams.

After overcoming these all groups set off excited and were greeted for the first few hours with pleasant mild conditions. Sadly, this weather did not last to the afternoon and the post lunch walking session was met with a drop in temperature and some heavy rain. Luckily waterproofs were at the ready and all students made it to basecamp before 6pm with only a few minor navigational errors.

At the camp they were treated to a lovely bit of early spring sunshine and a beautiful sunset as they set up tents and prepared their well-earned dinners. Tired legs and sore feet retired to bed early in readiness for the following day. After a chilly night and early start all happy campers were up and on their way by 8.30 to complete their routes. New found navigational skills on hand, the majority of groups made excellent time on Day 2 and impressed both school and Mendip Outdoors staff with their resilience, teamwork and progress. Even groups suffering from some Day I fatigue, and still getting to grips with map skills, remained positive and committed. All groups finished Day 2 by 4.30pm with students walking between 30 and 40km over the duration of the weekend.

Students have reflected on the challenges faced over the weekend and are feeling prepared to replicate the feats of the weekend when they participate in their qualifying expedition in September.

Envision Winners

Congratulations to the Year 10 students who took part in the Envision programme. They successfully won their pitch in their round of the Envision challenge! Envision is a UK charity that exists to empower young people to develop essential skills and confidence to succeed beyond the classroom.

The 12 week programme is a competition where students work with Envision staff and volunteer mentors from local businesses to tackle social issues affecting their community. The programme aims to develop communication, creativity, determination and teamwork skills in young people as well as their social skills and confidence.

The sessions take place weekly and the school's business mentors attend two of the sessions giving advice an sharing ideas.

The two challenges are the 'Pitching Challenge' where the students present a social

Climate Discussion

I attended a climate change meeting hosted by the Nailsea Climate Action Group. The event took place inside Nailsea School, and individuals were treated to tea, coffee and cake. Kingsley, a representative from the local Nailsea group, gave a warm welcome and introduced the night.

The need for climate action, and the evidence behind it was presented to us in a powerful motion. We were told to hold our friends and family close to us in our hand while we heard the devastating impacts climate change will have on us, if action isn't taken to significantly reduce global carbon emissions. After this, members of local and national environmental groups began to introduce themselves, and how they got involved with their cause, this included a Green Party member from the North

Somerset Council.

The panel then became open for questions, which allowed a monumental and overwhelming topic to be discussed in a careful manner. Once the conversations had slowed, we were given an activity to do with our neighbours. We brainstormed ideas that we could do personally to improve our sustainability. Not only did this inform me on sustainable practice but also gave me a chance to meet environmentalists who I might not meet otherwise. Once the time ran out, one member would present to the whole group with two of the ideas.

Although the meeting was two hours long, it felt like minutes as I was focused on every last detail. At the end of the night, you could write your email down on one the panel members sheet, if you had any further questions. Outside the auditorium were leaflets on how you could join the local groups or be involved in local actions to protest the lack of action over climate change. Overall, despite the meeting originating from devastating subject of climate change, it landed on a more positive note. Allowing inspiration and a sense of community to uprise and showed me how individual action can become collective action. Seeing so many members of the local community at the meeting gave me hope that this is possible.

Up On The Roof

After waiting months for the weather conditions become safe enough for us to walk on the roof, our geography class was allowed to tour around the school's energy sources. One of our Geography A-level topics is energy, and as a part of it we learn about radical technologies which are helping to create a more sustainable future.

As Nailsea School is a newer building, we have first-hand access to these technologies in action. Initially, we headed onto the roof where we looked at the solar heating panels which provide more than 30% of the hot water.



After this we looked at the air handling unit which exchanges air throughout the building in order to regulate temperature and CO2 levels. Next the guide mentioned the rainwater collectors which are found around the school, filtered with a natural membrane, and are cost effectively supplying most of the school's toilets with water.

For the final location we headed outside the biomass boiler, we entered the room in which the wood chips were burned. While exploring the sites we analysed the costs and benefits of each technology. This allowed us to gain a holistic view, and the guide even discussed upcoming projects the school may proceed with. Thank you to Mr Colbourn, the tour round the school was a nice change from traditional learning and made revising the energy topic fun and informative.

Bristol University Mock COP-28 Experience

The Mock COP-28 was an immersive negotiation experience held at Bristol University, designed to mimic the decision making processes that will happen at the real COP-28 in Dubai later this year. In 12 teams from different schools in the South West, we were given a country, organisation or company to represent alongside all the information we would need to know. We had to work towards resolutions of the biggest issues facing our planet such as mass farming and peak oil, whilst keeping the best interests of our country or organisation in mind.

The day saw every team setting out their main goals in an opening statement, followed by four rounds of fierce negotiations between teams. The day ended with voting on the potential resolutions we had been discussing. With my team representing the People's Republic of China, we had to make sure resolutions wouldn't harm our rapidly growing economy making negotiations with organizations who wanted more serious changes such as Greenpeace challenging. Many compromises had to be made in negotiations, leaving most teams unsatisfied with the final outcomes.

Overall, the mock COP-28 gave us great insight into how different countries may negotiate or interact with one another when looking for climate change solutions, and why it feels as if most events such as COP often lead to very little changes due to the compromises which are forced to be made. We all enjoyed the experience a lot and learnt valuable skills from it.

West of England School Summit review

the local area and learn how we as individuals can have a more environment focused mind set. We participated in three events throughout the day which included activities such as designing new, more sustainable transport and discussing ideas around how we can make a difference to the environment in our local

The day also included lots of talks from the West Of England Metro Mayor Dan Norris and the very enthusiastic Junior Saunders giving us insight into what our input does in the real world.
